MIDDLE SCHOOL SUMMER READING PROJECT

Each student should choose two books to read from the following lists. Books are listed according to the grade students will be entering in September.

Students should choose books they have not already read prior to this time.

All work must be typed (Times New Roman 12 font), handwritten neatly, or typed appropriately for a PowerPoint presentation.

For each book, the student may choose one of the following means of report:

- 1. A one-page standard report on the plot, setting, characters, and theme of the book. Include a personal analysis and response to the book. What appealed to you, or what did you dislike?
- 2. A PowerPoint presentation of the book including the above elements. You may include or skip the personal response.
- 3. A one-page written re-telling of the story from the perspective of a main character. For example:
 - "Hello. My name is Johnny Tremain. I lived in Boston during the most exciting time in the history of our new country! Let me tell you about it...."
- 4. The student may want to divide a standard sheet of poster board into six sections. Draw an important scene (comic-book style) in each section, and write a descriptive paragraph under each scene.

At the beginning of the school year all students will be asked to make an oral presentation of one of their reports. This will be a good warm-up to the school year and, I hope, a lot of fun.

Some ideas for the presentations are as follows:

- 1. For a standard written report, the student may want to share the book by "selling" its good points to the class, making them want to read the book.
- 2. Share the PowerPoint presentation.
- 3. Acting as the character in the book, tell the story. Dressing like the character or using props would be great!
- 4. Share the poster board comic presentation with the class along with a brief presentation of the basic elements (plot, setting, characters...).

Parents: Please make the book selections with your child to ensure that both content and reading level are appropriate. There are a wide variety of books listed. Many of the listed books are award winners and are extremely well written. Several should appeal to your child.

Both written and oral presentations will receive a grade. But, at the same time, let's try to keep this assignment as much fun as possible. The goal is to read and comprehend a couple of good books and to keep reading skills sharp, not to burden the child with lots of summer "homework."
